## **About Capricorn Group**

Capricorn Group is a southern African financial services group with a 42-year track record and a presence in Namibia and Botswana

Since its establishment in 1982, the Group has been an integral part of the Namibian banking sector, proudly maintaining Namibian ownership and listing on the Namibia Stock Exchange in 2013. Operating in Namibia and Botswana, our two banking subsidiaries, Bank Windhoek and Bank Gaborone, are complemented by subsidiaries and associates providing a range of financial products and services. Our subsidiaries include Capricorn Asset Management ("CAM"), Entrepo and Peo Finance.

As a Group, we are committed to sustainable economic development in Namibia and Botswana. While the Capricorn Foundation is the primary driver of the Group's CSR initiatives in Namibia, each subsidiary also supports and facilitates its own projects.

Our CSR vision: We aim to be an inspiring Connector of Positive Change in our communities by creating economic value in a responsible way that will unlock sustainable opportunities for advancing and improving economic and social conditions.

## Our CSR approach

The Capricorn Group CSR Policy informs decisions and actions applicable to the Capricorn Foundation and all other CSR initiatives within the Group and its subsidiaries. The policy outlines our CSR vision, philosophy, principles, and social investment areas and includes a framework for managing all CSR activities throughout the Group. CSR activities must be compatible with the Group's purpose, brand values, CSR philosophy and ethical standards. These are the aspects that our subsidiaries need to consider when identifying potential CSR initiatives:



## **Our definition of CSR**

CSR speaks to our sense of responsibility towards our communities and our commitment to integrating social issues into our business operations. Through our CSR, we are socially accountable to ourselves and our stakeholders. We are responsible for positively impacting society and alleviating any adverse effects.

## Our CSR philosophy

We are part of a greater community, and our investments in CSR contribute to a more prosperous customer base and a healthy operating environment.

Our communities benefit from the Group's success, which enables us to create and preserve value for all our stakeholders. This helps us to remain competitive while improving our communities' socioeconomic conditions.

We hope to make a positive and sustainable impact in areas gligned with our strengths and greas of competence. Our approach to being a responsible corporate citizen is built into the DNA of all our businesses. We support this approach by being open, transparent, and accountable in reporting on the Capricorn Foundation and Group CSR activities and programmes and their impact.

## Alignment with frameworks

We pursue our commitments to society in alignment with relevant national and international frameworks.

#### Harambee Prosperity Plan II

In March 2021, the Namibian government launched the Harambee Prosperity Plan II for 2021 to 2025. This plan builds on the foundation of the inaugural plan from 2016 to 2020 and aims to address Namibia's most pressing challenges through initiatives under five pillars:











The Capricorn Group and the Foundation endorse the Harambee Prosperity Plan II through its ethics initiatives, governance structures, commercial offerings and growth plans, community investment, renewable infrastructure, and sustainable financing.

Our CSR activities focus on the Social Progression pillar, which considers the development of a people-centred approach to improving the quality of life for all Namibians, including society's most vulnerable. This pillar provides the basic amenities for a dianified life, social mobility, and human development. This outcome is achieved through the following focus areas:

- > Addressing hunger and poverty
- > Urban land, housing, and sanitation delivery
- > Improved access to healthcare
- > Improved access to quality education and sports
- > Addressing gender-based violence ("GBV") and violence against children

#### The United Nations Sustainable Development Goals ("SDGs")

In September 2015, United Nations member states adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which outlined a prosperous future for people and the environment. This agenda is supported by 17 SDGs, and each SDG has specific targets and indicators. The Capricorn Group previously prioritised eight SDGs. Following the Capricorn Foundation's Board Strategy Session in November 2023, it was agreed that the Foundation and the Group look at redefining and reducing prioritised SDGs.

In October 2023, we approached the United Nations to receive training and consulting to assess our priority SDGs and identify tangible targets per goal. Capricorn Foundation and Group representatives attended the SDG impact standards for enterprises training in Cape Town in November 2023. The three-day training aimed to understand the SDGs and the impact management landscape, provide critical next steps to narrow the SDGs and identify the SDG targets and indicators to manage impact better.

In February 2024, with the assistance of a UN-accredited specialist, we reduced our SDG selection to three priority SDGs. The selection of SDG 2. SDG 4, and SDG 8 alians with the Group's overarching purpose, values, and business imperatives. Prioritising these SDGs will enhance the focus and impact of our programmes and underscore our commitment to support the inclusive growth, social equity and sustainable development needs in Namibia.

Using a structured approach, targets per SDG were identified and benchmarked against other financial services groups in Southern Africa. In June 2024, the Capricorn Foundation board approved these eight selected targets which will be recommended to the Group Board Social and Ethics Committee for adoption and aroupwide implementation in the 2025 financial year. Capricorn Group Champions per target were identified and formally engaged in leading the process of identifying initiatives, establishing baseline data, capturing new data, and reporting progress. A data management process was defined to ensure accurate impact reporting for measuring progress. informing decision-making, and achieving systemic change. We will report on progress against these SDGs and their targets in the 2025 social value report.



#### Our SDG strategy statements and targets



Goal: End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture.

We commit to improving food security, enhancing nutritional outcomes and advancing sustainable agricultural practices within our markets, specifically focusing on target populations/regions. By 2030, we aim to increase access to nutritious foods for 1,000 households and double productivity at 100 small-scale farmers. utilising sustainable, innovative practices and technologies. In partnership with communities, governments, NGOs (non-governmental organisations) and the private sector, we strive to build resilient food systems that can withstand environmental challenges and support the well-being of our communities.

# Leadership messages Message from the Group Chairperson

The Capricorn Foundation continues to live up to our purpose of improving lives by being Connectors of Positive Change.

It is a pleasure to present the third social value report of the Group This report captures the societal impact of the Foundation, Group and its subsidiaries. It details how we partner with like-minded organisations, businesses, public institutions, and civil society to positively impact the lives of the most vulnerable.

## Capricorn Foundation in 2023 – 2024

We focus on projects and programmes that speak to our selected focus areas: education and training, economic advancement, vulnerability, health and sustainability. We invested in a strategic stakeholder engagement on capacity building for NGOs and participated in climate change and sustainability discussions at the 28th UN Climate Change Conference ("COP28") in Dubai, United Arab Emirates. We acknowledge the important role of the Foundation and the impact of its CSR efforts in advancing the sustainability discussion in the organisation and beyond.

Investing in young people through early childhood development ("ECD"), vocational training, and entrepreneurship is crucial to the country's economic prosperity. In partnership with Bank Windhoek, we invest in skills and training through the Emerging Bankers Programme, launched in May 2024. The programme enables us to nurture young talent and help them to acquire the necessary skills and work experience. We understand our role as a responsible corporate citizen and will continue to develop and support CSR efforts to curb youth unemployment.

## Stepping up for Namibia

In May 2024, the Namibian government declared a State of Emergency following the worst drought experienced in 100 years. Against the backdrop of scarce rains, thousands of households have registered for the governmentfunded drought relief programme. As part of the response, the government urged Namibians to prioritise assistance to vulnerable communities to protect their livelihoods. The Group is evaluating how Bank Windhoek can ease the burden on its agricultural customers and how the Foundation can alleviate the suffering of the most vulnerable communities.

#### A collective effort

I acknowledge the Group, subsidiaries and Foundation boards for their strong leadership and solid governance processes. I am proud of what the Foundation has accomplished since its establishment in 2020 and recognise its commitment to being Connectors of Positive Change. I am grateful to our partners for their continued support and collaboration. I thank the many employees of our Group who, as Changemakers, took the time to participate in our CSR activities and play their part in transforming society for the better.




**Consolidated Group-wide CSR**



Investing in quality education remains a priority. We continue to support ECD centres, schools, youth-centred programmes and vocational training projects. We have collaborated with non-profits to understand how we can support disadvantaged youth and set them on the path to success. We launched the Emerging Bankers Programme in partnership with Bank Windhoek, which is providing training opportunities for ten school leavers from remote areas across Namibia over 18 months. By participating in the programme, they can gain valuable skills and training while working at selected Bank Windhoek branches.

# Boosting food security in Namibia

Creating awareness about food insecurity, hunger, and food waste has been a focus of the Foundation since 2022 and is especially relevant now as the country battles a crippling drought. According to media reports, every one in five Namibians is considered food insecure. The second Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge, our first signature project, was completed in 2023. Given Namibia's high rates of food insecurity and hunger, the Foundation will support projects and programmes aimed at promoting permaculture, thereby ensuring that communities are empowered to grow their own food in their backyards.

## Looking ahead

The Foundation is constantly seeking, evaluating, and creating new ways to effectively invest our resources together with other like-minded organisations. We look forward to enhancing stakeholder engagement and using international platforms such as COP29 to contribute positively to sustainability and climate change conversations. We will also focus on identifying vocational training and economic advancement opportunities that we can support, including in Namibia's emerging energy sector.

In 2025, we look forward to leveraging the positive impacts achieved through the Capricorn Foundation since 2020 to Bank Gaborone and guiding the bank in formalising its CSR efforts in Botswana.

## **Appreciation**

I want to express my heartfelt gratitude for the Foundation board's unwavering support, commitment and guidance. Their wisdom and insights have given the Foundation a clear direction to navigate challenges and seize opportunities. # Overview of the Capricorn Foundation

The Capricorn Foundation is a Section 21 Company and registered as a Welfare Organisation (W0499). Since 2020, the Capricorn Foundation has been committed to positively impacting lives by creating and supporting initiatives and programmes that advance CSR in Namibia and Botswana.

### The Foundation's vision

## Our vision statement is aligned with the Group's CSR vision:

The Capricorn Foundation aspires to be a Connector of Positive Change by being accountable to ourselves and our stakeholders. We seek to make an overall positive economic and social impact on society by investing responsibly in sustainable programmes that address national priorities in line with the SDGs.

#### What we do

Our main objective is to identify and fund programmes, projects or organisations that need support to positively impact local communities. We want to:

- > Act as the primary vehicle through which the Group manages its CSR activities in Namibia
- > Seek collaboration and partnerships between the programmes, projects or organisations supported by the organisation to achieve a more significant impact and consolidation of efforts
- > Provide financial and non-financial (in-kind) support to identified projects, programmes, or organisations
- Implement and maintain a well-defined process for monitoring and evaluating the progress and impact of our support.

## Stakeholder engagement highlights

We aim to inspire, empower and connect people so that they can achieve positive change.

During the year, we engaged and collaborated with various stakeholders across Namibia. We supported and hosted the following events this year:

## Representing Namibia at COP28





Capricorn Group, the Foundation, and Bank Windhoek joined the Namibian delegation at COP28 held in Dubai in December 2023. The Foundation's executive officer. Marlize Horn. presented a case study on the Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge, the Foundation's first international exposure for its CSR activities.

The Foundation contributed N\$200.000, and Bank Windhoek N\$300,000 to the Ministry of Environment, Forestry, and Tourism to ensure Namibia's successful participation at COP28. The Namibia Pavilion, themed "Powered by

Nature." was awarded the best theme at COP28.

COP28 provided an opportunity to build networks and relationships for future partnerships. We engaged with local and international stakeholders such as Namibian government ministries, private sector leaders, and civil society organisations.

Marlize Horn and Foundation board member Baronice Hans also attended the two-day inaugural CEO Business and Philanthropy Climate Forum, which ran parallel to COP28.

Leaders in business, philanthropy and policymaking from 82 countries gathered to engage and exchange knowledge on tangible climate and nature solutions. The forum addressed crucial climate issues, including the energy transition, climate finance, people and nature and inclusion.

Capricorn Group's active participation in COP28 demonstrated our commitment to addressing sustainability and climate-related risks, fostering sustainable development, and solidifying our role as a key partner in local and global climate action initiatives.



## NGO capacity building workshop









In November 2023, the Foundation and the Lithon Foundation hosted an NGO Capacity Building Workshop to empower NGOs to manage their organisations effectively and navigate the donor landscape, both locally and internationally.

The workshop was facilitated under the theme "Strengthening the management of NGOs to foster socio-economic developed communities in Namibia." The discussions covered various topics. including financial management, compliance requirements, branding and marketing strategies for NGOs, understanding funding streams, nurturing positive working environments, and improving communication skills.

B2Gold, the National Welfare Board, the European Union Delegation to Namibia, Side by Side Early Intervention Centre, Capacity Grow, and the Konrad Adenauer Foundation were among the stakeholders attending.

The Capricorn Foundation and the Lithon Foundation are known for their CSR initiatives. Their partnerships with NGOs and social welfare entities emphasise their belief in the critical role these organisations play in Namibia.





## Addressing malnutrition in Omaheke







In February 2024, we visited the Nutrition and Food Security Alliance of Namibia ("NAFSAN") team in Gobabis for a site visit and a half-day workshop focusing on the Omaheke region's malnutrition crisis, as part of our efforts under our Health and Vulnerability Focus Areas. The visit included the Epako Clinic Garden and the Gobabis State Hospital. At the time of the visit, 20 children were hospitalised in the paediatric ward due to malnutrition, highlighting the lack of food security in the region.

The workshop discussions included the post-discharge strategy and support from the Ministry of Health and Social Services, including social counselling support, follow-up visits and sustainable ongoing support needed within the region, such as nutrition and health education and sustainable gardens.

On Friday, 15 March 2024, the Capricorn Foundation and Wolwedans Foundation officially launched a unique partnership in Maltahöhe. The Capricorn Foundation pledged N\$1 million towards the Wolwedans Foundation's flagship initiative, Rural Revive: Building a Desert-based Economy, showcasing its dedication to economic advancement, sustainable development and the empowerment of the Maltahöhe community.







## Our funding model

We receive financial support from the Group and Namibia-based subsidiaries Bank Windhoek, Entrepo and Capricorn Asset Management ("CAM"), and Capricorn Unit Trust Management Company ("CUTM"). The Group contributes to the Foundation by paying the salaries of the executive officer and Capricorn Foundation coordinator and providing additional administrative support through its various departments.

The Foundation received a contribution of 0.85% of the preceding year's profit after tax from Bank Windhoek and CAM, including CUTM, and 0.555% profit after tax from Entrepo, totalling N\$11,158,137 (2023: N\$8,576,952). The Foundation allocated N\$11.8 million to projects and programmes across primary and supplementary focus areas, including purchasing a vehicle. Unspent funds are rolled over to the new financial year to fund new applications.

# **Education and training**

Namibia has one of the highest unemployment rates and its education system does not adequately prepare children for the world of work. The Foundation invests in education and training to equip and empower young people.

## The African Child Development Trust ("ACDT")

Education is crucial to a country's socioeconomic prosperity. However, access to quality education and resources is challenging for many southern African countries. Projects such as the ACDT seek to address the lack of quality, affordable, accessible, and multilingual learning materials in Namibia. This educational project is a collaboration between the Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture and Namibia Media Holdings.

Over the last four years, ACDT has provided thousands of children, especially in low-income and marainalised communities, with essential learning resources. This has allowed more children to engage in regular and practical learning activities, increasing school attendance and participation rates. ACDT has contributed to the quality of teaching by empowering teachers and educators with quality educational materials.

ACDT distributed over 312,500 books to schools and ECD centres in underserved areas this year. The outreach included pre-primary learners and Grade 1 to 3 learners.

Learners can access learning materials in English, Afrikaans, Oshikwanyama, Oshindonga, Khoekhoegowab, Otjiherero, Rukwangali, Rumanyo and Silozi.

## **DRC Women Community Project | ECD**

The DRC Women Community Project advocates for the well-being of women and children. The project focuses on social development, community engagement, education, nutrition, health and well-being, and empowerment.

The project, based in the DRC Settlement in Swakopmund, offers craftwork and needlework trainina. a feeding programme, a garden, and an ECD centre.

With the Foundation's financial support, the organisation has expanded and enhanced its programmes. The Foundation's contribution has covered school materials for 30 children, procured educational resources, and provided nutritious meals to underprivileged children. The Foundation also supports its feeding programme and provides stationery for the ECD centre.





## Amos Meerkat Schools ("AMS")

Amos Meerkat Schools prepare children in rural parts of Namibia for Grade 1 through its syllabus project. AMS provides children and teachers in remote non-governmental schools with an updated Christian curriculum aligned with Ministry of Education standards.

Trained AMS monitors are tasked with facilitating the implementation of the syllabus at the schools. They become facilitators and motivators and collaborate with local communities. Monitors undertake monthly visits to their allocated areas and host preparation, prayer and care meetings every three weeks to prepare for upcoming syllabus themes. AMS has trained 24 new teachers who participated in three-weekend workshops.

AMS partnered with NAFSAN to create awareness about the importance of nutritious meals. Monitors underwent a two-day training workshop to discuss how they can educate teachers and learners about healthy eating.

With support from the Foundation, AMS printed 60,000 workbooks this year and distributed stationery to the schools it supports.

## Beautiful Kidz – Anusa Project

Beautiful Kidz Welfare Organisation is a non-profit that provides educational and social support to underprivileged children in Windhoek and the Ovitoto rural area. The Anusa project provides school uniforms to learners who cannot afford them.

The lack of proper school uniforms affects children's self-esteem, attendance, academic performance, and overall well-being. So far, the project has donated 350 school uniforms to Grades 1, 5, 6 and 7 learners. In 2024, the Foundation donated 200 summer uniforms for boys and girls and 150 winter tracksuits, to benefit 13 schools. Between 2018 and 2023, CAM donated 2,811 school uniforms.





#### Learn On One

LearnOnOne is an innovative educational initiative that closes the digital gap by offering supplementary education through broadcast television. The initiative ensures that Namibian learners from diverse backgrounds can access vital after-school lessons and resources.

Since launching in 2020, LearnOnOne has positively impacted Namibian learners through partnerships with the government and private sector, school activations, regional outreaches, and curriculum enhancements. In 2024, the initiative expanded its reach by hosting its first activations in Namibia's North and coastal regions.

The Foundation pledged N\$200,000 towards LearnOnOne. The partnership will enable LearnOnOne to enhance the role of television as a medium to make quality education accessible to every child in Namibia. The initiative offers secondary school materials, as well as ECD and primary school lessons, to be aired on One Africa Television and made available on the LearnOnOne website.

## **SPES Charity Trust**

SPES Charity supports impoverished children through a holistic programme focusing on four essential levels: cognitive, emotional, physical, and spiritual. The organisation aims to break the cycle of poverty by providing a support structure for the children as they develop and grow.

Capricorn Foundation funded training material and teaching aids for all pre-schools and teachers. We also supported SPES in supplying monthly food parcels for the children. The parcels include dry ingredients, meat, fruits and vegetables. Ensuring children access nutritious food is essential for their development and overall well-being.

During the year in review, 60 teachers received training on the SPES day-to-day programme, which was developed from the Ministry of Education's curriculum. The programme is implemented at all pre-schools registered as part of the SPES Charity Trust.

Promiseland Trust is a non-profit that drives positive change in the lives of vulnerable children through its education, nutrition and foster programmes.

The organisation's impactful work is implemented through various channels, including the ECD centre, school feeding programme, soup kitchen, after-school activities and resource centre, farming project, and foster project.

We allocated funds to support the Promiseland School Feeding and Farming projects.

The feeding scheme supplies food for seven local primary schools three days a week, and it distributes 7,170 sandwiches each week.

The farming project is located at Tutaleni Primary School, where Promiseland grows fresh produce for its soup kitchen while educating the children about self-reliance and the importance of nutrition. Promiseland has a greenhouse at the school that is currently being extended and updated. Both projects align with the Foundation's focus on raising awareness about Namibia's food insecurity and nutrition.

Homework and Extra Classes: Offer a safe space for children to complete their homework and projects, as well as extra classes and necessary academic support.

Chess Club and Girls Club: Weekly clubs to foster social and cognitive development.

Holiday Programs: Engaging activities during mid-term breaks to keep children off the streets.

Community Support: Provides first school uniforms and supplies for children graduating at age six and continues support through their soup kitchen and afternoon classes.

Volunteer Programme: Hosts German Red Cross volunteers on a 12-month cycle.

Weight and Height Monitoring: Monthly health monitoring and daily meal tracking to ensure nutritional goals are met.

**Fundraising Events:** Organises events such as bingo nights, charity golf events and collaborates with partners for support and sponsorships.







## The One Economy: #BeFree Youth Campus

The One Economy Foundation's youth development initiative, #BeFree Youth Campus, provides integrated multidisciplinary services that take a holistic approach to young people's well-being.

We have extended our contribution to the initiative by committing N\$517,000 towards the #BeFree Youth Campus' training facility, bringing the total contribution to the campus to just over N\$1 million. The first contribution of N\$500,000 was handed over in October last year to construct the Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths ("STEM") Training Centre.

Through the generous support of the Foundation, the #BeFree Youth Campus has implemented a comprehensive range of services tailored to the diverse needs of youth.

These services include financial assistance. educational resources, vocational training, mental health support, and community engagement initiatives. By addressing the multifaceted needs of young people, the #BeFree Youth Campus has become a vital hub for youth empowerment and personal development.

Capricorn Foundation's support has also enabled the #BeFree Youth Campus to expand its offerings. The initiative provides access to educational materials, workshops, counselling sessions, and mentorship programs that equip youth with invaluable skills and knowledge. The Youth Campus also offers activities such as boxing, chess, and music and learning opportunities in robotics, computer literacy, and entrepreneurship.

## **EduVision Online Learning**

EduVision Online Learning addresses rural-urban education gaps, enhancing Maths, Physics, Chemistry, Economics, and Biology education for remote and marginalised schools through e-learning and modern technology.

Eighteen schools received support from EduVision Online Learning. The organisation hosted live interactive lessons and workshops for teachers and learners on how to use the digital equipment efficiently.

We have committed to adopting two schools, Pioneer Secondary School in Schlip and C.//Oaseb Senior Secondary School in Gibeon. Each school received a contribution of N\$335,000 per school to improve online learning access.



## **Development Workshop Namibia: The Play for All**

Development Workshop Namibia champions the well-being and protection of vulnerable children.

The Play for All: Strengthening Early Childhood Development in Namibia project enhances educational opportunities, improves health and well-being, and fosters socioeconomic development. By improving ECD infrastructure, such as building new toilets, classrooms, and playgrounds, the project creates a safe and conducive learning environment for children in Omaheke.

The project provides extensive training for educators to help them expand their ECD knowledge and understanding, enabling them to provide quality education. The organisation also facilitates community and parent engagement through workshops and ECD awareness campaigns.

## Meerkat Learning – Teaching at the Right Level (TaRL)

Meerkat Learning's TaRL Programme seeks to improve learners' numeracy and literacy skills countrywide. TaRL is an international approach to enhancing basic numeracy and literacy abilities in primary schools on a national scale.

The programme engages the youth, mainly students and unemployed graduates, to run after-school "catch-up" classes. By 2024, the programme had implemented youth-led TaRL classes in 20 schools, reaching approximately 2,000 learners in Grades 3-6. The initiative also trained and supported teachers who offer TaRL learning support classes. The teacher-led TaRL classes were implemented in 105 schools and reached over 10,000 learners.

In 2024, the programme scaled its implementation to five regions, focusing on integrating TaRL into the educational systems of each regional directorate.

This featured comprehensive strategy co-training with education officers, holding workshops with school principals, conducting joint monitoring school visits with school inspectors, and sharing monthly reports on programme implementation progress and challenges. Meerkat Learning hopes every school in the country will have free and effective TaRL classes by 2030.

The Capricorn Foundation sponsored TaRL activities at D.F. Uirab Primary School in Kamanjab, Kunene region. The funding supported teacher training, educational materials, and overall programme facilitation, ensuring that the TaRL methods are appropriately executed and sustained at the school.

The Emerging Bankers Programme, part of Bank Windhoek's Young Talent Programme, launched in Windhoek in July 2024 with the announcement of ten successful candidates.

The Capricorn Foundation pledged N\$1 million to the Bank Windhoek Young Talent Programme via the Emerging Bankers Programme, which addresses youth unemployment and accessibility to on-the-job training for young Namibians.

In its experimental phase, the Emerging Bankers Programme will offer ten Grade 12 class of 2023 graduates the opportunity to join Bank Windhoek for an 18-month comprehensive training programme. The successful participants will receive training across various banking disciplines but will primarily be based at selected Bank Windhoek branches, namely Aranos, Karasburg, Oranjemund, Lüderitz, Opuwo, Oshifo, Katima Mulilo, Mariental, and Ondangwa.

The Emerging Banks Programme offers selected candidates a unique chance to develop professionally and personally while preparing them for successful careers in the dynamic banking field.





#### Edla's experience

Edla Hivahala Tjikaka from northern Namibia is one of 10 trainees selected for the programme. For 18 months, she will be placed at the Outapi branch, where she will learn about the banking profession in a supportive environment.

I started at the tellers and learnt how to handle deposits and withdrawals and count money using machines. Then, I moved to enquiries, assisting with various banking tasks, such as helping seniors. I also gained experience in sales, including helping students open accounts. I worked in the credit department, which requires specific knowledge and training.

This experience provides valuable work experience and increases my chances of finding employment; I am inspired by my branch manager, Ms Eelu Tulela Loini, who is passionate about uplifting others.

My mother has no job, and my family has faced many challenges. The money will help me achieve financial independence and allow me to relieve my mother from the burden she carries.

Business Box provides underprivileged people with the skills and mentorship to thrive as entrepreneurs. In 2023, the Capricorn Foundation supported the Business Box Windhoek Programme. In the previous financial year (July 2022 - June 2023), the Capricorn Foundation invested N\$572,500 for the Business Box Windhoek initiative and hub, where 72 young people participated in the Be Your Own Boss programme. They received coaching and mentoring on the stages of business creation, enabling them to become investor ready.

All participants started businesses through the programme and 63 are still operational and at various levels of business growth. The programme has positively changed participants' lives, families, and communities. A Business Box Windhoek survey showed that its programmes' minimum direct impact is five to eight people per participant.

Business Box will continue to build the entrepreneurial movement by onboarding more people onto its programme. This will help young people start or build businesses, create jobs, unlock potential, and create more opportunities to impact lives.

In 2024, Business Box bundled its Be Your Own Boss programme into a Business in a Box concept as part of its nationwide aim to establish an entrepreneurial movement and empower as many people as possible. This Box serves as a weekly and daily connection point with the individual, guiding and mentoring them through the stages of business growth to become investor-ready and scaleable. It expands Business Box's reach to young people beyond a physical location.

With the Capricorn Foundation's assistance, Business Box has onboarded eight people on the programme since June 2024, following rigorous searches for applicants who met requirements. So far, they are making progress, with one person in the Building the Business concept phase and the other seven in the Proving the Business Concept phase. The Capricorn Foundation has invested N\$135,000 for the eight participants involved in the Be Your Own Boss Programme.

The impact to date has been life-changing as it has shifted their thinking. Business Box has partnered with four of the participants to take the programme to their towns and areas of influence. The participants cover a diverse range of industries including creative, automotive, customer service, business services, and farmina.

## Rural Revive: Building a desert-based economy

Capricorn Foundation, in partnership with the Wolwedans Foundation, has committed to uplifting the community of Maltahöhe Village by supporting a desert-based economy project called Rural Revive.

Maltahöhe is a small village of 6,000 inhabitants situated 450 kilometres outside Windhoek. The village was previously known as the home of the karakul sheep industry. Since the decline of this industry, Maltahöhe has seen little economic advancement. Many people are communal or commercial small livestock farmers, while others are in community gardening.

Since its launch in 2022. Rural Revive has two key projects, laundry services and horticulture, which employ 15 full-time employees and several part-time workers across various parts of the project. In the last two years, the initiative has imparted skills and knowledge to over 80 communal farmers and 20 aspiring entrepreneurs in the EconoMix group and trained nearly 100 farmers in horticulture and organic production.

The Foundation's contribution will go towards the following initiatives:

- > Horticulture capacity building and skills transfer, which includes setting up five small holding farmers for organic vegetable production.
- > Establishing a fresh produce distribution hub called The Barn Tradina Post, with a customised app.

- > A guaranteed market price stimulus to buy produce from the small-holding farmers and communities.
- > An integrated waste management and recycling facility to create livelihood opportunities.
- > EconoMix business basics skills transfer programme will serve as the backbone to entrepreneurial empowerment across all Rural Revive business development projects.

#### **Progress to date**

Rural Revive has made progress on the following Capricorn Foundation-sponsored projects:

Horticulture

The programme has identified five farmers for the project, and infrastructure has been set-up, with ongoing practical training.

EconoMix skills transfer programme

The first cohort of aspiring entrepreneurs are now pursuing diverse business ventures with funding of N\$2,000 each. The second cohort of seven community members is engaged in bi-weekly meetings and mentorship calls to develop business plans. Video content for learnings from the workshops is being developed and will be publicly available through video tutorials.

The Barn Trading Post and App Development

The BuddyApp system has been piloted at Wolwedans and will now commence in Maltahöhe for the Rural Revive Barn.

**Recycling Facility** 

A new property has been secured and infrastructure set-up is underway. The management team has undergone training at Rent-a-Drum.

The Women at Work project supports and empowers individuals by providing them with the skills to thrive in the workplace. The project considers individuals with a limited education background and offers training in dressmaking, pattern design, laundry, hospitality, cooking, and baking. Once they have completed the course, students receive certificates that can help them secure employment. Besides technical training, the programme also equips students with financial, communication and life skills.

Trainees often secure employment opportunities in the hospitality industry, including in hotels and guest houses. Seven of the 38 students trained this year have been permanently employed, while three have secured temporary employment.

"I enjoyed cooking, ironing and bedmaking. The training has helped me improve my knowledge and skills, and I will continue to practice to satisfy my future employer. The trainer was one in a million."

For three decades, Omba Arts has supported the sustainable living of artisans and artists in rural communities. The organisation develops and markets traditional and contemporary handcrafts and San contemporary art.

By partnering with the Foundation, Omba Arts has expanded its support for San artisans. The financial support has enabled more frequent and impactful field visits, improved the supply of materials, and ensured timely payments for handicrafts. It has also allowed Omba Arts to address critical needs such as food security and connectivity, contributing to the overall well-being and development of the artisan communities.

"Omba's money helps us buy food and pay for school fees. Omba's workshops teach us to make our baskets more beautiful."







## **Capricorn Foundation Food Waste Challenge**

The Food Waste Challenge launched in June 2022 as the Foundation's first signature project. The project called for innovative ideas to reduce food waste in the country. The first Challenge was hugely successful, receiving 101 submissions. The second Food Waste Challenge launched in April 2023 with 152 submissions, both on an open innovation platform. Ideas included those focusing on sustainability, longer shelf life, nutritional preservation, alternative protein sources for their potential to benefit Namibians and solutions that can create or expand self-sufficient social enterprises (businesses).

The Food Waste Challenge aimed to promote and develop entrepreneurship, create sustainable employment, and raise awareness about food waste in Namibia. Entrants submitted written proposals for solutions to reduce food waste and address food insecurity. The proposals were evaluated on a theoretical basis considering relevance, innovation, feasibility, scalability, sustainability, impact and inspiration.

Oshakati-based entrepreneur and founder of Awana Foods, Sara Ekondo won the first phase of the Food Waste Challenge. Her solution to reduce food waste is sourcing excess and B-grade agricultural produce from local farmers and transforming it into value-added products with a longer shelf-life, such as chutney, concentrated syrup and dried vegetables.

The N\$100 000 cash prize helped Awana Foods build a production facility. This has enabled the business to expand, grow, and divert the funds initially allocated to rent to other functions that spur growth.

"As an entrepreneur, winnings like these validate our value proposition. It has given me the confidence to continue building on the value proposition in sustainable and economically empowering ways. We can now approach funders for funds to scale our production and build our team to process more food products to absorb even more of what would otherwise go to waste," Sara said.

The second Challenge concluded in May 2023. The top five proposals were evaluated by a panel of experts representing various sectors of the economy who appraised five finalists in the final round in June 2023 in the "Eagles Den" at Capricorn Group's Head Office. The finalists had to pitch their ideas and answer questions during the live event streamed by Synergi Marketing.

Ndasilohenda Katangolo-Nakashwa, a communal farmer from Opuwo Rural Constituency in the Kunene Region, was thrilled when her team won the prize for their innovative approach to preserving nutrients in fresh produce in the Phase 2 Challenge. She received an N\$100.000 cash prize from the Capricorn Foundation, an N\$50,000 brand and marketing package and three months of mentorship training from Business Box.

Ndinandali Farm, an agricultural venture dedicated to preserving nutritional value and extending the shelf life of fresh produce, has revolutionised marketing and distribution methods. It's dried vegetables, including spinach, tomato, and cabbage, have become popular food staples in rural villages and towns.





#### Q: How does your project contribute to reducing food waste in Namibia?

A: My project focuses on creating a sustainable system for growing and preserving vegetables, specifically spinach and tomatoes. By using shade nets to grow and dry these vegetables,



we can extend their shelf life and reduce food waste. The drying process allows us to preserve surplus produce, ensuring a consistent supply of nutritious food throughout the year.

Our project supports local communities by providing nutritious vegetables throughout the year, even during off-seasons. Additionally, our project creates job opportunities and promotes sustainable agricultural practices within the community, fostering economic growth and food security.

#### Q: What encouraged you to participate in the Challenge?

A: It aligns perfectly with my mission to reduce food waste and promote sustainable agriculture. The Challenge presented an opportunity to gain support and recognition for our innovative approach to tackling food waste and collaborate with like-minded individuals and organisations dedicated to this cause.

The Foundation has supported our project by providing the resources to implement our innovative solutions. This support has enabled us to construct two shade nets of 50m by 20m. One is for growing spinach and tomatoes, and the other is for drying the vegetables in a controlled environment. Their recognition and support have helped us expand our operations and reach a wider audience.

#### Q: How will winning the Challenge advance your project?

A:Winning the Challenge is incredibly rewarding and validates our efforts. It provides us with the necessary resources to expand our project. With the prize money, we will build the shade nets and improve our vegetable drying process. This advancement will enhance our operations' efficiency and allow us to rebrand our packaging and reach more consumers, ultimately contributing to greater food waste reduction in our community.

We aim to expand our operations and increase the scale of our vegetable growing and drying processes. We aim to reach more communities, provide training on sustainable farming and food preservation techniques, and ultimately create a model that can be replicated across Namibia and beyond. We aim to significantly reduce food waste, enhance food security, and promote sustainable agriculture practices on a larger scale.



## Men on the Side of the Road ("MSR")

For 17 years, MSR has equipped programme participants with essential skills, enhancing their employability and enabling them to pursue sustainable career paths.

The programme helps its registered members gain employment by facilitating and paying for their vocational training and partnering with businesses and organisations for job placements. This project focuses on youth, unskilled workers, and vulnerable communities that may not have many employment opportunities.

The MSR programme participants undergo a two-day training programme to learn communication skills, prepare CVs and understand interview skills, general work conduct and financial management. MSR has introduced new initiatives to meet the evolving needs of its participants. These include training programmes in first aid, safety, shop assistance, basic English proficiency, gardening, and digital literacy.

With support from the Foundation, MSR has enhanced its training programmes, developed new initiatives and reached many unemployed individuals in Namibia.

"I walked to MSR every day to read the newspaper or use the internet. It gave me faith that my phone would ring one day and an opportunity would come. Eventually, I got a job with the help of MSR."

The Response Action Based Organisation advocates for the prevention of violent crimes, abuse, neglect, and suicide attempts\ prevention through door-to-door community educational engagements in the fight against societal vices/crises response/ rescue and intervention.

The organisation ensures that victims get the required and necessary resources and support. It focuses on amplifying community engagement in the fight against violence, especially GBV. The organisation supports soup kitchens every Saturday to ensure children receive nutritious meals weekly. The organisation also ensures that food is put on the tables of as many families as possible, ensuring they do not go hungry, especially children, as starvation is a reality in communities. The organisation tries to reach out to often neglected communities and do school visits to talk to learners about negative behaviours affecting their future.

#### HappyLand Safe Haven

For 19 years, HappyLand Safe Haven has provided a safe environment and shelter for vulnerable and orphaned children in Henties Bay.

HappyLand offers emotional, physical and psychosocial care to children aged 0 to 20, including children with disabilities. With support from the Capricorn Foundation, HappyLand ensures that children's basic needs, including food, clothing, and other necessities, are met.

HappyLand provides children with access to quality education from early childhood to tertiary. This empowers them to escape poverty and eventually become independent and self-sufficient individuals. HappyLand currently supports five individuals studying at tertiary institutions in Namibia.

This year, the organisation enhanced access to sustainable food security, nutrition, medical supplies, school clothing, and shelter, improving children's health and social lives. The Capricorn Foundation has also supported the project by constructing a boys' room. Previously, the boys' room was made of hardboard, exposing them to cold weather conditions.



#### **Imago Dei**

For 16 years, Imago Dei has supported disadvantaged communities by sourcing funding from companies and individuals for organisations and initiatives that help those in need.

The organisation supports soup kitchens, kindergartens, ECD centres, nursing homes, training programmes and places of safety nationwide. In 2024, Imago Dei secured funding for community projects and focused on strengthening existing donor relationships through community outreaches and projects. Imago Dei assisted various existing projects on its database in continuing their daily operations and expanding or improving the structures used by their projects. With the Foundation's support, Imago Dei purchased a vehicle for the team to visit projects in remote locations.





#### World Food Programme ("WFP"): Promoting sustainable food processing

Food loss and waste are great concerns in Namibia and globally. Reports show that approximately up to 40% of harvested crops in Namibia are lost due to poor storage, transportation, processing, and marketing. This significantly impacts on the economy, food security, and nutrition. In efforts to address these challenges, WFP and the Capricorn Foundation joined forces to design and implement a programme promoting nutrition sensitive and sustainable food processing techniques in the Hardap Region. The project aimed to build on the success of the current WFP and Capricorn Foundation supported food systems projects and programmes within the region, based in Stampriet, Schlip, Bernafay and Maltahöhe. The programme entailed various activities including conducting hands-on value-addition training for 45 individuals (including pregnant and breastfeeding mothers), youth and people living with HIV and Tuberculosis. Beneficiaries include the parents of the learners at Stampriet Combined School, communities from Bernafay Resettlement Farm and Stampriet Constituency Office Food Systems Project, and Schlip Integrated Food Systems Project.





The communities were trained in making pickled beetroots, beetroot juice, tomato paste and sliced carrots. The training was facilitated by the University of Namibia, and the market access training was conducted by GS1 Namibia. The next phase includes conducting training on good agricultural practices by the Ministry of Agriculture, Water and Land Reform, allocation on planting allotments to the trainees at their respective projects, provision of value addiction starter-up packages per site consisting of inputs, equipment, and materials, enabling them to plant, add value and market their produce. Based on the vegetable cropping timeline, this phase will occur over two to three months. Additional nutrition education and cooking demonstrations are planned to take place in September 2024, focusing on the importance of food preparation and the consumption of nutritious diets. This will improve the shelf-life of fresh produce, enhance the taste, and diversify diets. It will also improve competition and food quality while increasing the profitability of food products, creating employment opportunities, and improving livelihoods.

Our partnership with NAFSAN addresses two of our focus areas. Health and Vulnerability Initiatives. NAFSAN addresses the country's food security and malnutrition challenges as an official technical partner to the government within the context of Namibia's revised Food and Nutrition Security Policy and its coordination structures.

Since 2020, NAFSAN has fostered participation and multisectoral coordination among different stakeholders and empowered organisations, communities, and individuals with information, tools, skills, collaborative platforms, and advocacy to achieve food security and nutrition for all.

As an umbrella body for civil society organisations, academia and the private sector, NAFSAN has worked to identify synergies and foster partnerships for genuinely sustainable positive change.

In the year in review, the Foundation supported NAFSAN with a N\$220,000 donation to finalise and print materials for the highly participative Nutrition-for-Health approach (www.nafsan.org/N4H). NAFSAN members will use these materials to educate communities, schools, ECD centres, parents, and caregivers on nutrition and empower them to make healthy eating choices.

The Foundation also contributed N\$291,000 towards combating malnutrition in Omaheke, by purchasing urgently needed ready-to-use therapeutic food and high-protein nutrition supplements. This has ensured that malnourished children have a fighting chance and has contributed to the development of a multi-stakeholder post-discharge strategy that will prevent high rates of re-admission of malnutrition patients.

#### Gobabis State Hospital – **Infusion Pumps**

In March 2024, the Capricorn Foundation and NAFSAN visited the Gobabis State Hospital – Paediatric Ward. The purpose of the visit was to understand the malnutrition situation in the Omaheke Region, the efforts of the hospital and government, and how the Foundation can provide support.

At the time of our visit, 20 children were hospitalised due to malnutrition. Following this engagement, the hospital expressed an urgent need for infusion pumps, which they borrowed from another ward at the time. The Capricorn Foundation purchased ten infusion pumps valued at N\$264,500 for the paediatric ward, to benefit the hospitalised children.



#### **Namibia Heart Foundation**

According to the World Health Organisation, cardiovascular diseases are the leading cause of death globally, taking an estimated 17.9 million lives each year. The Namibia Heart Foundation ("NHF") conducts awareness and prevention campaigns to educate the public about the risk factors for heart disease and strokes.

The campaigns include community workshops, seminars, and health screenings, empowering individuals with knowledge and tools to adopt healthier lifestyles and prevent cardiovascular diseases. The NHF's prevention initiatives focused on promoting physical activity, healthy eating habits, smoking cessation, and stress management, contributing to improved overall health and well-being within the community.

The NHF provides essential support services to individuals and families affected by heart disease and strokes. These include counselling to help patients manage their conditions effectively and improve their quality of life. The organisation also actively engages with the community through partnerships, collaborations, and outreach activities.

We have provided essential financial support to NHF, enabling the programme to sustain its operations, implement critical initiatives, and expand its reach within the community. This funding helped NHF to cover expenses related to awareness campaigns. prevention initiatives, support services, and operational costs, ensuring the continuity and effectiveness of its programmes. The partnership has also facilitated networking opportunities for NHF, connecting the programme with other organisations, healthcare providers, government agencies and community stakeholders.





#### Desert Research Foundation of Namibia ("DRFN")

DRFN supports research and addresses sustainable development in desert environments. It tackles issues such as water, energy and land from a human and environmental perspective.

DRFN has supported and worked with the San Donkerbos community for two decades. The organisation ensures that San communities have opportunities to improve their livelihoods. This includes addressing community challenges relating to water and sanitation, education, health services, nutrition and agriculture.

In 2024, the DFRN installed solar home systems for 75 Donkerbos households and led local programmes with the Ministry of Agriculture, Water, and Rural Development in conservancies in the Kunene region.

The Capricorn Foundation partnered with the DFRN to support its water pump installation and borehole rehabilitation project for 35 households in Donkerbos, Omaheke Region.



#### **Edu-Light**

Learners in disadvantaged communities, especially in rural areas, often face the challenge of studying by candlelight due to the lack of access to electricity. The Edu-Light initiative by GreenVille Solars addresses this challenge by providing learners with solar study lights.

Over the years, the Edu-Light initiative has improved the productivity levels of school learners by ensuring they can study and concentrate on their schoolwork at night. This increases the chances of academic success.

The solar study lights also ensure that learners study in a safe environment. Studying using candlelight or paraffin lamps can increase fire risk and potential respiratory issues due to toxic emissions. The solar study lights are cost-effective and last up to five years. Edu-Light agents in the selected regions identify learners needing solar study lights. The programme has also received additional support from the Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture.





#### Wadappt: Rhino Guardianship Certificate **Programme**

Capricorn Foundation solidified its commitment to environmental conservation by becoming one of the first organisations to invest in the Rhino Guardianship Certificate Programme.

The programme raises funds for conservation efforts and ensures the safety and well-being of Namibia's rhinos. From January to March 2024, 28 rhinos were killed by poachers in Namibia, including 19 at Etosha National Park.

The programme is part of a partnership between Save the Rhino Trust Namibia and Wadappt, a nature financing platform that provides a marketplace for capital to connect with nature projects. The Rhino Guardianship Certificate is a unique initiative to safeguard Namibia's world's largest free-roaming herd of black rhinos by supporting the Khoisan community and anti-poaching rangers.

By purchasing these certificates, individuals and organisations can contribute towards conserving critically endangered species and supporting the indigenous communities dedicated to protecting these animals. With our support, at least 90% of the total cost of the certification is directly allocated to support the anti-poaching rangers that form part of this initiative.



#### **Development Aid from People to People** ("DAPP") Namibia

DAPP Namibia is a development and non-governmental organisation committed to alleviating prevailing socio-economic challenges amongst vulnerable rural communities.

The Foundation partnered with DAPP Namibia to support its community outreach programme. This programme aims to improve the nutritional status of rural families by introducing nutrition gardens at household level and providing fresh vegetables for daily consumption. Awareness of the relevance and benefits of balanced nutrition is the foundation of this approach.

Throughout this programme, project beneficiaries learn how to sustainably grow vegetables using best practices, considering limited resources. The insight, knowledge, and experiences gained will improve the wider community's livelihoods while positively impacting national food security and self-sufficiency.



Project facilitators equally gain practical expertise by facilitating learning processes and actively engaging in capacity-building events, such as nutrition awareness facilitation within communities.

In April and July 2024, a nutrition training session was conducted at the DAPP Vocational Training School to equip the project team with knowledge and skills to create awareness about nutrition in the community.

The project targets 20 clusters of 20 households each in the vicinity of the DAPP Centre based at Onambelela in the Omusati region. In March 2024, DAPP held cluster consultations to introduce the project as well as to provide information on the nutritional value and content of the different types of crops that the participants will be growing in their backyard gardens.

"Initially, I thought focusing on the garden wastes time. When my things started to sprout, I was so proud. I don't go to the supermarket to buy tomatoes, onions, spinach, egaplants, and chilli, but soon my carrots and beetroots will arow."

The Capricorn Group Schools Netball League kicked off in May 2024, marking its seventh year with Capricorn Group as its lead sponsor. The league is a partnership between the Namibia School Sports Union and the Group to encourage sports development at the schooling level.

The league provides a platform for Namibian netball teams from age groups U/12 to U/19 to compete for the title of national league champions. This initiative develops and promotes netball in primary and secondary schools. It also highlights the importance of sports and their positive impact on young people.

The number of participating teams increased by 20% from 2023, bringing the total number of teams to 85.

#### **Bank Windhoek Cancer Apple Project**

The Bank Windhoek Cancer Apple Project was launched 24 years ago and is one of Namibia's biggest and longest-running CSR fundraising initiatives. Since 2000, the project has raised N\$35 million for the Cancer Association of Namibia. The project creates cancer awareness and educates Namibians on the importance of regular cancer screenings.

The 2023 Bank Windhoek Cancer Apple Project raised N\$2 million. The funds were used for the national outreach campaign, which focused on free screening and testing for Namibians nationwide while creating awareness about the disease. The funds were also used for the patient financial assistance programme and the newly established Palliative Care Centre in Windhoek.

Employees are involved in implementing the project. In 2023, 150 employee representatives were appointed to coordinate the project on behalf of their branch or department.
